





Destination Waterfront Development Vision




Destination Waterfront Planning Area



Destination Waterfront (DW) Outcome Statement

- The Port Peninsula develops as a Destination Waterfront that offers restaurants, recreation, public art, visitor accommodations and gathering places while ensuring connectivity with the water, nearshore and the existing downtown core.
- The Port of Olympia Destination Waterfront features an inviting and walkable environment that is home to at least one anchor hospitality tenant, Swantown Marina offices, and a mix of mission driven and small business enterprises.
- There are **public amenities**, **interpretive and educational displays** and opportunities for both **active and passive recreation** with an emphasis on **view preservation**.
- Standards for adaptation to sea level rise have been developed and implemented, and environmental cleanup and restoration efforts are well underway.

Destination Waterfront (DW) Recommendations

- Billy Frank, Jr. Trail enhancements
- Develop partnerships with the City of Olympia and water-craft community groups to explore opportunities for community amenities
- Billy Frank, Jr. Park and North Point Community Event Center improvements (Holbrook Building)

Billy Frank, Jr. Trail Enhancements

• The Objective:

 Improve and enhance the Billy Frank, Jr. Trail that originates at the south end of the planning area and ends at the north end of the peninsula

• Status:

- Port Staff are installing Billy Frank, Jr. kiosks and signs
- North end of trail not connected to the parking lot
- Surface is uneven in places and may not be ADA accessible
- Directional information and signage lacking
- Recommended Commission Action:
 - Take steps to improve signage, landscaping, connect to parking lot on north end, and make ADA accessible if necessary

Boating and Sailing Community Amenities

• **Objective:**

• The Port will work with partner organizations to develop recommendations for the location and features of a center that would provide water access to small sailboats, kayaks, canoes, paddleboards, Dragon Boats, and other watercraft

• Status:

- DW committee met with Olympia Community Sailing, South Sound Sailing Society, City of Olympia staff, and Port staff to identify short and longer-term options. Boating community will work with Port staff to develop boat storage options and other amenities.
- Port has installed Paddleboard and Kayak stands at Swantown Marina
- Recommended Commission Action:
 - Have a work session with the Olympia Community Sailing and other groups to learn about their plans
 - Explore with the City of Olympia options for cooperation

Billy Frank, Jr. Park & North Point Community Event Center Improvements


• Recommended Commission Action:

- Create an enhanced Billy Frank Park and develop a Community Center to maximize the public's enjoyment and access to the Billy Frank, Jr. Park (Site A).
- Enhance the area with additional **landscaping** and other enhancements such as **picnic tables and children play structures** to encourage family usage
- Connect the Billy Frank, Jr. trail to a designated parking area
- Consider constructing a **small amphitheater** on the asphalt area
- Consider building a **bathroom**, potentially using existing plumbing in the Holbrook building
- Obtain public input into what amenities they would like, that fall within the DW Development Vision, in a Park, Trail, and Community Center.

Area: 109,735 sf (2.51 acres)

Current Use: Parking / Office Building / Undeveloped

Zone: Urban Waterfront (UW) Industrial (I) *partial

Allowable Height: UW-40 = 40'-0'' 25' within 75' of Ordinary High Water Mark (OHWM)

Building Setback: None


Shoreline Setback 100' & 50' Vegetation Conservation Area

Allowable Coverage: 60%



Other Ports Recognize the Benefits Why haven't we?

A growing number of Ports are recognizing the benefits of providing enhanced water access, picnic areas, restaurants, and other public amenities.

- Provides direct, tangible benefits to Port taxpayers
- Increases tourist revenue for area businesses, which creates jobs
- Provides Port lease revenues


Most of these public amenities are on sites that were formally contaminated and remediated.

Port of Bellingham

The Port of Bellingham is developing 33 acres of parks and trails as well as 6 acres of restored public beach.

Port of Everett

The Port of Everett has six parks and plazas.

The two-acre Boxcar Park is the newest park and incorporates the historic Weyerhaeuser building (red roof, on right), which is now a coffee and whiskey bar.

Port of Kalama

The Port of Kalama created the Westin Amphitheater adjacent to Marine Park, one of three parks at the Port.

Two of the parks have ball fields. All three parks are on the river and have restrooms.

Port of Vancouver

The Port of Vancouver has partnered in a private/public partnership to create a master plan including 7.3 acres for a *new* community park.

Port of Tacoma

The Port of Tacoma's Dick Gilmur Habitat Restoration and Kayak Launch is a concrete ramp that allows easy access for the public to bring their kayaks to the shores of Inner Commencement Bay or to walk along the shoreline.

The Julia Gulch is 31 acres of forested open space, purchased by the Port of Tacoma to serve as a buffer from the Port's industrial area and residential NE Tacoma. Julia Gulch contains a network of urban trails where people can discover native plants in an urban oasis.

Port of Silverdale

The Kitsap County's playground lays adjacent to the main pier. Kids enjoy the many activities in the playground as well as beach combing on the shores.

The park also has several barbecues, gazebo, and covered area for parties.

Port of Seattle


